the greek and roman world is often noted for the rationalism of a few outstanding thinkers this book is about the traditional superstitions beliefs taboos folk remedies ghost stories and folk tales that haunted the rest along the way it considers such questions as do modern approaches help or hinder our attempts to see ancient superstition from the inside can we break down the barriers between folk tales and myths did it really matter whether a healing herb was picked by moonlight or not was there a cinderella tale in the ancient world the volume begins by asking how we can attempt to define folklore in the first place and how we can make sense of the vast amount of materials available it examines the prejudices of writers who report folkloric information and explores the cultural contexts that shaped their materials it includes numerous examples and texts such as tales legends proverbs jokes riddles and traditional customs the volume overviews critical approaches to the study of ancient folklore and it surveys the presence of greek and roman folklore in classical culture because of the tremendous interest in the ancient world this volume will meet the needs of high school students and general readers

the central theme of this volume is to re examine the received concepts and images of ghosts in various religious cultures ranging from the ancient near east and egypt to the old testament the classical era early medieval and early modern europe early india

and medieval china as a religious phenomenon the realm of ghosts has been less studied than the realm of the divine through a collaborative effort by scholars from different disciplines this volume proposes a multi cultural approach to construct a wider and complicated picture of the phenomenon of ghosts and spirits in human societies and to have a grasp of the various problems involved in understanding the phenomenon of ghost

in this book clinton debevoise corcoran examines the use of place in plato s dialogues corcoran argues that spatial representations such as walls caves and roads as well as the creation of eternal patterns and chaotic images in the particular spaces times characterizations and actions of the dialogues provide clues to plato s philosophic project throughout the dialogues the good serves as an overarching ordering principle for the construction of place and the proper limit of spaces whether they be here in the world deep in the underworld or in the nonspatial ideal realm of the forms the good since it escapes the limits of space and time equips plato with a powerful mythopoetic tool to create settings frames and arguments that superimpose different dimensions of reality allowing worlds to overlap that would otherwise be incommensurable the good also serves as a powerful ethical tool for evaluating the order of different spaces corcoran explores how plato uses wrestling and war as metaphors for the mixing of the nonspatial eternal forms in the world and history and how he uses spatial images throughout the dialogues to critique athens s tragic overreach in the peloponnesian war far from merely an incidental backdrop in the dialogues place etches the tragic intersection of the mortal and the immortal good and evil and athens s past present and future

this volume offers the first comprehensive overview of the evolution over time of a foundational concept of the egyptian afterlife beliefs the duat or netherworld the duat is a complicated multifaceted notion which was never canonized into a single version of the beyond but offered instead a variety of alternatives attempting to describe the metaphysical realms beyond the visible world and beyond life theological speculations gave rise to a rich textual and visual repertoire which underwent a process of evolution over thousands of years during which newer ideas and images were constantly introduced through the analysis of royal and non royal funerary texts from the late old kingdom to the end of the new kingdom this book traces the development of the conceptualization of the notion of duat outlining what it encompassed and where it was imagined to be located in addition to the translation and discussion of the most significant passages of the texts analyzed each chapter also provides an overview of the individual compositions and of the relevant theological cosmological and astronomical notions complementing the conceptual

framework of which the duat formed but a part additionally discussions of concurrent changes in egyptian culture society and ideology are included in order to clarify the context in which afterlife beliefs and related texts evolved an analysis of the correlation between funerary compositions and their material supports complements the study emphasizing the egyptians belief in a magical synergy between texts images and their contexts in the activation of a suitable effective afterlife for the recipients of the texts
